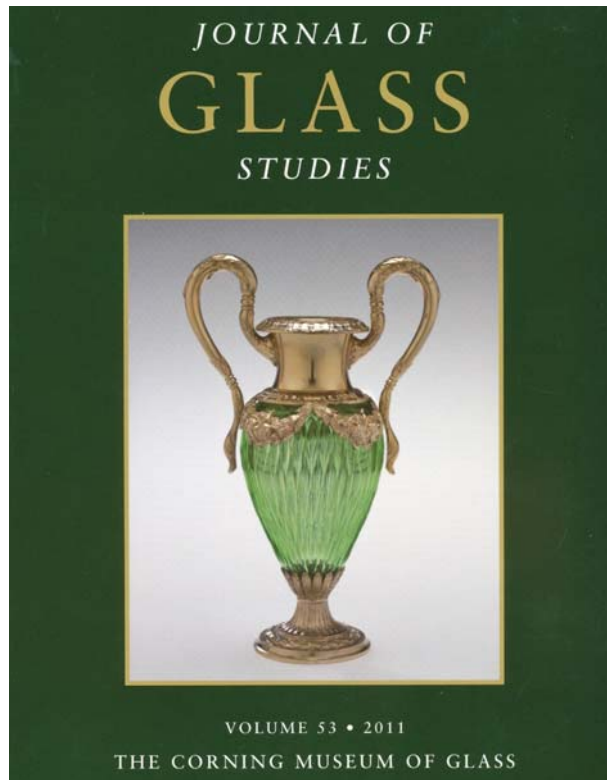

Fragments of a Cage Cup from Grenoble: Technological Elements

Some cage cup fragments were discovered during the excavation of the Eglise Saint-Laurent, an early Christian church in Grenoble, France. These fragments came from a cup that was broken before it was completed. Several aspects of the fragments - the upper border of the network, the position of the bridges, and the texture of the surfaces - were studied in a comparative analysis of the two predominant hypotheses regarding the manufacture of cage cups. It was possible to demonstrate that the vessel from Grenoble was made by grinding a thick-walled blank, thus confirming the hypothesis supported by the frequent experiments of Josef Wetzel.

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
